INTRODUCTION

Philippians is a genuine authoritative Pauline epistle. It is Paul's most joyful letter. Paul was very strategic in his choice of places to preach. What was special about Philippi?

- It was a commercial center. It had gold and silver mines.
- It was founded by Philip, the father of Alexander the Great. It was named in his honor. It was the crossroads between Europe and Africa.
- It was a Roman colony, with military significance. Roman language was spoken, Roman dress was worn; Roman customs were followed; Roman magistrates were given Roman titles. Roman pride permeated their thoughts. Paul wanted them to remember they were a colony of heaven. They were Christians.

Joy No Matter What.

PURPOSE

- To thank the Philippians for their gift (1:5, 4:10-11).
- To ensure a good reception for Epaphroditus as he returned home, having been sick (2:29-30).
- To encourage the Philippians during their time of trials (1:28-30).
- To inform the Philippians of Paul's situation and his prospects for the future (1:12-26; 2:24).
- To prepare the way for Timothy's coming (2:19-23).
- To appeal for unity (2:1-11).
 - Two women who endangered the peace (4:2).
 - False teachers seeking to lure them from the path of truth (3:2).

- To settle certain problems:
 - Persecution by unknown opponents, possibly Gentiles stirred up by Jews (1:28-30).
 - False teachings by Jews or Jewish-Christians (legalists or Gnostics) (3:2-19).
 - Dissension among members. (1:27; 2:2-3; 4:2-3).

TEACHING

Philippians is a book about excellent things. It is permeated with joy. It is a book of religious feelings. It models how we ought to behave as Christians when we face the hard realities of life and death. "When the going is toughest, the footing is surest, the strength most abundant, and the joy most radiant."

Paul teaches us about:

- 1. Christian joy.
 - a. Reason for joy. . .
 - i. Prayer (1:4).
 - ii. The preaching of Christ (1:18).
 - iii. His experiences honors Christ (1:19-20).
 - iv. His death might aid the Philippians (2:17).
 - v. The hope of the believers' steadfastness and unity (4:1; 2:2).
 - vi. The Philippians' gift (4:10).
 - vii. Joy for the Philippians in the progress of their faith (1:25).
 - viii. The possibility of his sacrificial death. (2:18)
 - ix. Their restored relationship with Epaphroditus (2:28-30).
 - x. That they were incorporated in Christ and the church (4:5).

xi. They can do all things through Christ (4:13).

- 2. Self-denying concern for others.
 - a. Christ's self-denying concern for others. His exaltation by God (2:5-11) contrasted with some of the Philippians' selfish, grasping spirit who were clinging to personal privilege and glory (2:3; 4:2-3).
 - b. Church members are to have the mind of Christ.
 - c. Church members are to imitate Christ in radical selfrenunciation.
- **3.** The path to the glory of the resurrection.
 - a. False teachers were about to lure them away.
 - b. The path is marked by:
 - Renunciation of merit all human assets from heredity, personal choice, and accomplishment (3:4-8).
 - ii. Identification with Christ through faith sharing in his suffering, His death, and the power of His resurrection (3:9-11).
 - iii. Relentless pursuit of reaching the goal of eternal life (3:12-16).
 - iv. Imitation of Christian leaders who have set their minds on heavenly, rather than earthly realities. (3:17-21).
